Definition of Rotary

How do you describe the organization called "Rotary"? There are so many characteristics of a Rotary club as well as the activities of a million Rotarians. There are the features of service, internationality, fellowship, classifications of each vocation, development of good will and world understanding, the emphasis of high ethical standards, concern for other people and many more.

In 1976 the Rotary International Board of Directors was interested in creating a concise definition of the fundamental aspects of Rotary. They turned to the three men who were then serving on Rotary's Public Relations Committee and requested that a one-sentence definition of Rotary be prepared. After numerous drafts, the committee presented this definition, which has been used ever since in various Rotary publications.

"Rotary is an organization of business and professional persons united worldwide who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations and help build good will and peace in the world."

Those 31 words are worth remembering when someone asks, "What is a Rotary club?"

The Orphanage project under Governor Bill Skidmore had three segments. They were; 150 mattress replacements for 75 bunk beds with a sheet for each; a generator for the Medical Clinic; and a 40-foot container shipment of food, medical supplies and other needed items.

I am pleased to tell you that your care and concern for the children

of the Orphanage have helped Gov. Bill tremendously in achieving success in this International Service Project. The order for 150 mattresses was placed on June 30 for delivery to our container site at Corpus Christi Catholic Church in Willingboro, NJ, no later than August 25th, 2000. I am pleased to announce that there were 24 clubs, businesses and individuals that

contributed one or more \$400 units for a total of 36 units equaling \$14,400. This project touched the hearts of many Rotary Clubs in our District and our neighbor to the South, 7640, as well as several individuals. In addition, a number of these donors also provided funds for the purchase of food to be sent in container #6.

The Wrightstown Area Rotary Club “Rails to Trails” Community Service Project

The Wrightstown Area Rotary Club is hard at work converting an abandoned rail line, which runs through one of the communities served by the Club, into a walking and biking path. The service project in Springfield Township, Burlington County, was inspired by the success of neighboring Pemberton Rotary's conversion of over five miles of rail bed between Pemberton and Birmingham into a treasured recreational facility. Nationally, thousands of miles of disused rail lines are undergoing conversion with the blessing and financial support of federal and state governments. (See May issue of “Rotarian”). Together, the two clubs are continuing the Pemberton path into the town of Wrightstown, and their long range plan is to connect the two trails where the rail rights-of-way intersect just east of the hamlet of Juliustown.

The Wrightstown Club has removed saplings, stumps and railroad ties from over one thousand feet of trail in an

area adjacent to the municipal playing fields in Jobstown since commencing work in mid June. Past President Robert Kay, Sr. has spearheaded the effort being made by Rotarians and townspeople. Over the coming three years, the Club intends to complete over three miles of trail from the Northern border of Springfield Township at the town of Columbus, to the link with Pemberton Rotary east of Juliustown.

The project began when the Springfield Township Council formed a committee to explore the feasibility of a rail bed conversion like Pemberton's. Bob Kay immediately recognized the potential for Rotary involvement and suggested the project to the Club, which, after consultation with Pemberton Rotary, unanimously supported undertaking the effort. The Springfield Township Council owns much of the right-of-way slated for conversion, and has placed the Wrightstown Club in charge of the work.

In addition to hands-on work, the Club is also actively drafting grant proposals to help fund installation of an all-weather surface, gates, signs, benches and other amenities. The Club intends to coordinate with the County to seek reconfiguration of the Rail Trail's crossing of Route 537 in Jobstown to enhance pedestrian and cyclist safety. The final hurdle to completion of the three year goal is convincing the private owners of a few sections of the right-of-way to grant easements for their bits of the trail. The Wrightstown Club hopes that they will be able to copy Pemberton's success in this arena; one factor in their favor is the ringing praise which landowners generally have for trails adjacent to their homes. Most find the trail unobtrusive, and that it enhances property values.

For now, the Wrightstown Club is taking it one thousand feet at a time.

Rotary Leadership Institute

WHAT ARE THE COURSES?

The Institute offers a leadership development program in three full day sessions (Parts I, II and III). The courses are designed to provide Rotary knowledge and to develop leadership skills for voluntary organizations. Some examples of course sessions include, "The Perfect Meeting", "A Look Outside the Club", "Membership Orientation and Activation", "Introduction to Leadership", "Creating Service Projects", "Problem Solving Workshops", "Vocational Service", "Effective Committees", "Membership Development", "The Rotary Foundation", "Analyzing a Rotary Club", "Object of Rotary", "The District", "International Service", "Problems of Leadership", "Creative Service", "Written Communications" and "Motivating Rotarians and Effecting Change".

WHEN AND WHERE ARE THE COURSES HELD?

Courses are held at various locations throughout the year to accommodate the Rotary clubs of the member districts. Any nominee may take a course in any location. Course locations and dates are announced in this brochure, governors' newsletters and at various district events.

WHAT ARE THE TEACHING METHODS?

The Institute believes in course sessions with as much discussion/participation as possible. Discussion breakout sessions are limited to approximately 10-15 persons. Lectures are strictly limited. Course methods include discussion groups, role playing, problem solving workshops, creating projects and audio visual presen-

tations. Everyone participates during one of the Institute's sessions. A course workbook containing an Institute Manual, session program agendas, faculty biographies and course outlines and materials, is provided to each attendee.

WHO ARE THE FACULTY?

The faculty members are carefully selected by the Institute for their teaching abilities. They are drawn from all areas of the member districts and occasionally from outside the member districts. Many are present and past R.I. directors, present and past district governors, successful past presidents and those with experience in special areas. Each new faculty member must attend an initial full day training program and various reorientation programs periodically. The results of evaluations help the Institute to improve the course content and instruction.

WHY DO WE NEED A LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE?

Rotary needs a constant influx of leadership as club officers, etc. change every year. It is difficult at the club level to learn enough about the exciting world of Rotary with its 1.2 million members in 162 countries. Furthermore, leadership skills in a voluntary organization are often different from business leadership skills. It is important that club leaders have every opportunity for education because the success or failure of our clubs depends in large part on the quality of their leaders.

WHO SHOULD BE NOMINATED TO ATTEND THE INSTITUTE COURSES?

The Institute recommends that candidates should have those qualities that mark them as potential club leaders, not necessarily future presidents. They should be at least 3-4 years away from a possible presidency or other high leadership post. They should certainly have a strong interest in Rotary and be ready to be exposed to the larger world of Rotary. The Institute requests each club to nominate one or two Rotarians each year.

WHAT ARE THE COSTS?

The current course fees are \$85 per registrant per day. The fees include breakfast, lunch, coffee breaks and considerable materials given to participants. Course fees also pay for meeting space, audio-visual equipment and promotional costs. We recommend that clubs pay the fees for their nominees.

SHOULD OUR CLUB PARTICIPATE?

If your club cares about its future, it will want the best leadership possible. This is an outstanding opportunity for each club to improve the Rotary knowledge of its key people and to be exposed to new ideas of leadership. The exchange of ideas with other experienced Rotarians alone makes the courses worthwhile.
