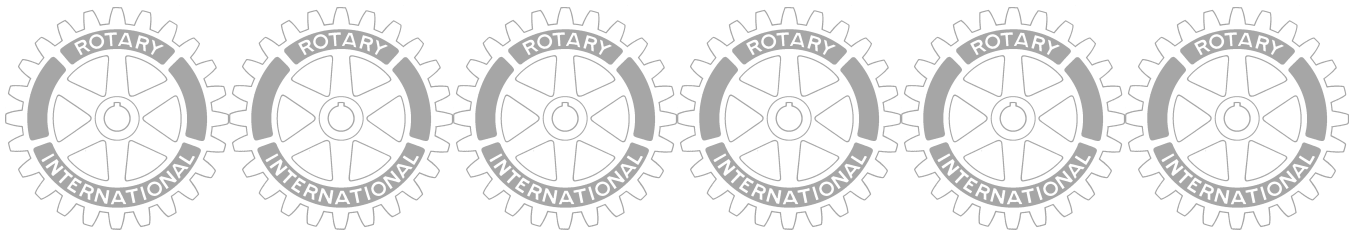
In 1987 Jeff became a member of the Matawan Rotary Club. He served in all positions of leadership cumu-

What Is The Share Program?

The Foundation SHARE system of funds control allows Rotary districts to decide how most of the money donated to the annual programs fund of the Rotary Foundation is allocated to service programs. Under this SHARE system, the funds received for the annual fund from a district, its clubs and their Rotarians, is divided into two parts at the end of each Rotary year.

Of the total amount received, 60 percent is placed in the District Designated Fund (DDF), while the other 40 percent goes to the World Fund. The 40 percent which goes to the World Fund is used by The Foundation to pay for world wide programs available to all Rotary districts, regardless of the amount of district contributions. The 60 percent credited to DDF is used by the district to fund the Foundation programs in which it chooses to participate, such as Ambassadorial Scholarships, matches towards Matching Grants, and other humanitarian programs, Grant to University Teachers, an extra Group Study Exchange, a contribution to another district, etc.

The Annual Programs Fund contributions in a given year are held and invested by the Foundation for three years and are then allocated to the programs of The Rotary Foundation Leadership Team, after consultation with Rotarians in the district, selects the program to which the DDF funds are allocated in accordance with the costs set forth in a special booklet distributed by The Foundation. Of course the district may only allocate the amount in the DDF for that year. The more contributions to the annual Programs Fund, the more funds available for the district to allocate to a program of its choice.

The system is called SHARE because the name defines what the system does: (1) Rotarians SHARE their resources with fellow Rotarians around the world; (2) The Trustees of the Rotary Foundation SHARE their decision making with the districts; and (3) Rotarians SHARE Rotary with the world through their Foundation. The important thing to remember, when thinking about the SHARE system is That We Get to Select Where Our Money Goes from Our Contributions.
