This will allow three sick children from other countries to come to the United States to have life saving heart surgery.

# Rotary Club of Forked River donates \$7,000 to upgrade Medical Clinic in Santo Domingo

As part of their ongoing commitment to help those in need in third world countries, the Forked River Rotary Club announced today it has voted to give \$7,000 US to the Hogar Escuela Armando Rosenberg Orphanage and School located in Santo Domingo in the Dominican Republic.

The school has recently built a new medical clinic, including a laboratory and dental center to serve not only the residents of the orphanage and school but to the local area residents as well. Rotarians throughout New Jersey recently completed a fund drive to supply the clinic with an on-site generator and fuel storage tank but found themselves in need of additional money to fund some unexpected construction costs. Rotarian Lou Embriaco heard about this need from Orchid Foundation President Harold Wooden. The Orchid Foundation is a non-profit US Foundation that supplies most of the funds needed to run the orphanage.

Lou Embriaco brought this request to the members of the Forked River Rotary who agreed to fund the request. "With any luck, the construction base and housing for the generator will be in place by the end of March and the generator should be on-line by Mid-April" said Rotarian Embriaco. "This will then give the medical clinic uninterrupted power to continue to serve the medical needs of the orphanage, school and local community".

According to Rotary Club Presidents Peter Obbard and Jack Ginsberg, the money raised will help fund scholarships and community service projects.



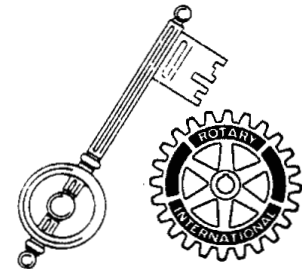

that attract lots of tourists all over the year.

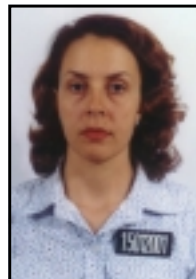
In 1990, I took a one-month English course in England and in the same year I started studying Electronic Engineering at the Federal University of Pernambuco.
