On September 11, terrorists tried to destroy that way of life by bring down one of the Great Symbols of our success – The Twin Towers in New York City. Susan's Healthful Hints

A philosophy professor stood before his class and had some items in front of him. When class began, wordlessly he picked up a large empty mayonnaise jar and proceeded to fill it with rocks right to the top, rocks about 2" in diameter. He then asked the students if the jar was full? They agreed that it was. So the professor then picked up a box of pebbles and poured them into the jar. He shook the jar lightly. The pebbles, of course, rolled into the open areas between the rocks. The students laughed. He asked his students again if the jar was full? They agreed that yes, it was. The professor then picked up a box of sand and poured it into the jar. Of course, the sand filled up everything else.

"Now," said the professor, "I want you to recognize that this is your life. The rocks are the important things – your family, your partner, your health, your children – anything that is so important to you that if it were lost, you would be nearly destroyed. The pebbles are the other things in life that matter, but on a smaller scale. The pebbles represent things like your job, your house, your car. The sand is everything else. The small stuff. If you put the sand or the pebbles into the jar first, there is no room for the rocks. The same goes for your life. If you spend all your energy and time on the small stuff, material things, you will never have room for the things that are truly most important. Pay attention to the things that are critical in your life. Play with your children. Take time to get medical checkups. Take your partner out dancing. There will always be time to go to work, clean the house, give a dinner party and fix the disposal."

Take care of the rocks first – the things that really matter. Set your priorities. The rest is just pebbles and sand.

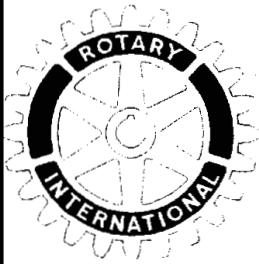

Rotary has recognized him with the International Service Award for a Polio Free World and Rotary's highest honor, the "Service Above Self" award.

Lou and wife, Barbara, currently develop and own commercial properties. They have four (4) children and (3) grandchildren.

GIFT OF LIFE WELCOMES TWO CHILDREN

Last week, within a 24 hour period, two children arrived in America, in quest of possible life saving heart surgery.

After traveling for almost 30 hours from Beijing China, 12-year-old Zhen-Zhen Yao and her Mother arrived at New York's LaGuardia Airport at about 11 PM Sunday, August 19th. They were greeted at the airport by the Chinese contingent of Rotary District 7250 (Brooklyn-Queens-Nassau) Gift of Life.

On Monday, August 20th, Mom and Daughter traveled to Pemberton, New Jersey to meet their host family, Peggy and Jerry Jerome.

On Tuesday, August 21st Zhen-Zhen was admitted to Deborah Heart & Lung Center in Browns Mills. After examining her, doctors determined she was suffering from "severe pulmonary valve stenosis", among other things. However, it was determined that perhaps a more simple procedure could be performed to correct Zhen-Zhen's problems, rather than resorting to the more dangerous option of open heart surgery. Thus, on Thursday, August 16th Zhen-Zhen underwent "cardiac catheterization and balloon valvuloplasty". The operation was a success and after only one day in intensive

care, doctors authorized her release from Deborah.

Zhen-Zhen returned to the Jerome's, where she will recuperate before returning to China. It should be noted, that Zhen-Zhen was brought to the Foundation's attention by the newly formed Rotary Club of Beijing. We will provide more information about this unique Club in the near future.

About 18 hours after Zhen-Zhen arrived at LaGuardia, Ruth and Leo Feeley (PRC Club) greeted 6-year-old Diana Vargas and her Mother as they arrived at Philadelphia International Airport from Quito, Ecuador.

Unfortunately, the prognosis for Diana does not appear to be as bright as her Chinese counterpart.

After initial examination at St. Christopher's Hospital for Children in Philadelphia, a dental appointment was scheduled, where she had 11 teeth removed under anesthesia.

Currently, Diana is scheduled to have catheterization performed on Tuesday, August 21st and a "stint" installed in her lung. The next day she will undergo open heart surgery. We will keep you informed of her progress.

PAST DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S NEWS CORNER

The following article was submitted by Past District Governor, Chuck Abbate:

New Generations

1996-97 International President Luis Gray added service to the New Generations and "Growing Up At Risk" to the Rotary Programs. His idea was to serve underprivileged and inform our young people of the hazards of the things we face every day.

Just a few years ago we did not have mass murders in schools or work places. The images on screens of movies or TV, new and stronger drugs pop up every year, faster cars and more dare devil sports.

Many people shake their heads and ring their hands and say it's just part of the world today, but I know that we Rotarians can offset the negativity.

Let me share what had a positive effect during 1996-97. Partnerships were formed with high schools and students for assemblies.

Young people were selected by their school or they volunteered (a term we all know) to participate in a four hour session to discuss subjects of their choice. We found schools that were willing to give us space. We provided juice, donuts, soft drinks, etc.

The session started with a short morale building talk by a Rotarian, then the young people selected subjects they wanted to discuss from a menu we provided or they were free to choose their own subject. There were break-out sessions we did not sit in nor were any parents allowed to sit in on their session, so they could talk freely.

After the break-out sessions a leader gave a report on their subject to a general assembly. Again we did not offer any opinions, unless we were asked. We received many thanks and many said they were leaving with more knowledge on how to face the challenge.

Gov. Jeff and others I have spoken to have expressed interest in having programs this year. If your club thinks it's too much to handle alone, we can form groups and have a county-wide program.

Please call Gov. Jeff. Let's help stop the steamroller that has destroyed so many young people. We can make a difference; all we need to do is be willing to let the young people talk and woaite a better and safer world.

USA - Flooding

Massive flooding has swept away homes and businesses in several communities in West Virginia, leaving residents in need of immediate aid. Up to ten Rotary clubs have been affected as well, with the possibility of half permanently shutting down. US \$50,000,000 in damage has been estimated. The Governor of District 7550 is seeking International assistance to help these victims recover. To support relief efforts, contributions can be made payable directly to "Rotary District 7550 Flood Relief Program", Account #570006684 and sent to Boone County Bank, P.O. Poland - Flooding

Thousands of people have lost their homes and farmlands in recent floods that have devastated Southern Poland and killed at least 25 people. Residents are left with nowhere to go and are struggling to repair their homes and farms after loosing their crops for the year. The Governor of District 2230 is seeking International assistance in the recovery process. To support relief efforts, contributions can be made payable directly to "Rotary Polish Fund-Flood 2001," Account #10501041-2200701726 and sent to Bank Slaski S.A. O/Warszawa, Grójecka 81/87, Warszawa 02-094, Poland. Districts in other countries are also encouraged to utilize SHARE District

Taiwan - Typhoon and Flooding

Severe flooding caused by Typhoon Tau-chi in Taiwan destroyed numerous villages and left nearly one hundred people dead following storms on 30 July 2001. Hundreds more have been injured, missing, or left without homes. Total damages have been estimated at more than US \$300 million. The Governor of District 3460 is seeking International assistance to replace numerous bridges and schools that were destroyed by floodwaters. To support relief efforts, contributions can be made payable directly to "Disaster Relief, R.I. District 3460", Account #0013-28-38932-1-1 and sent to Asia Pacific Bank, Business Department, No. 66 Min Chuan Road, Taichung 400, Taiwan. Districts in other countries are also encouraged to utilize SHARE District Designated Funds allocated to the Humanitarian Programs category for the Rotary year 2001-2002 (maximum of US \$10,000).

India - Flooding

Record-breaking floods have plagued the State of Orissa in Eastern India. As rivers swell from rainstorms, thousands of homes and fields have been washed away, forcing people to seek refuge. More than 700,000 people have been displaced and more than US \$300 million worth of crops have been damaged. The Governor of District 3260 is seeking International assistance to help these victims recover. To support relief efforts in the district, make checks payable to Rotary International, earmarked for disaster relief in District 3260, and send to Northern Trust Bank, P.O. Box 75297, Chicago, IL 60675-5297, USA. Districts in other countries are also encouraged to utilize SHARE District Designated Funds allocated to the Humanitarian Programs category for the Rotary year 2001-2002 (maximum of US \$10,000).

At the Rotary convention in San Antonio, UNICEF Executive Director Carol Bellamy made the welcome announcement that all proceeds of the "Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF" campaign for this year and next will go to polio eradication. This action by the US Fund for UNICEF is in direct support of the private sector appeal being jointly sponsored by Rotary and the United Nations Foundation (UNF).
