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Tax Amnesty Program

As you may know, Governor McGreevey recently signed legislation creating a limited Amnesty program for overdue state taxes. Under Tax Amnesty, people and companies will pay only the back taxes that they owe; all interest and penalties will be waived during the Amnesty period.

New Jersey's Tax Amnesty begins on Monday, April 15, and will end at midnight on June 10, 2002. All State taxes administered by the Division of Taxation are eligible for Amnesty.

Because this subject may be of interest to Rotarians and members of other business organizations, the Division of Taxation has established an Amnesty Speakers Bureau, comprised of senior Division officials who are available to make presentations on the program and answer questions about it. Speakers are available for meetings held between April 15 and June 10. Presentations can be tailored to meet your group's needs.

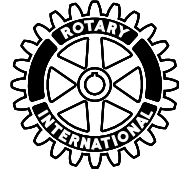
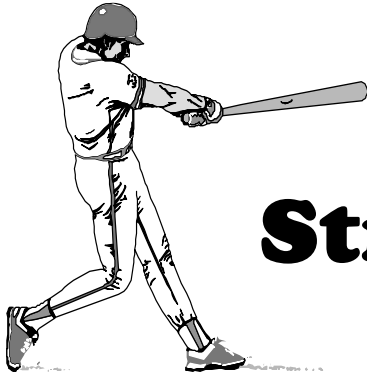
